

Water kiosks

Taps providing clean water. These are controlled by the operator from inside the kiosk once payment has been made.

Lockable shutters to keep staple goods and documentation like inspection logs and finance books safe.

The price of water is shown on the kiosk so everyone knows how much they have to pay.

Water kiosks are set up by our local partners and run by attendants who provide their community with clean, safe water for an affordable fee.

When someone buys water from a kiosk, the money they spend is used to pay the bills from the water service provider.

The remainder goes to the kiosk attendants, who also sell staple goods, such as soap, candles and basic food items, to supplement their income so they can take care of their kiosk and build a better future for themselves and their families.
